Marx's View: Expropriation and Proletarianization



Forced Dispossession

Enclosure Acts forcibly stripped free peasant proprietors of their ancestral land rights and access to common resources like pastures, woodlands, and water.

Systematic Theft

Marx characterized enclosure as "systematic theft of communal property" that deliberately destroyed smallholdings and traditional rural livelihoods across England.

Creating the Proletariat

Millions of peasants became landless wage laborers with no choice but to sell their labor, swelling the ranks of the industrial proletariat.

Rural Depopulation and Urban Migration



Village Destruction

Enclosures led to the systematic demolition or decay of peasant cottages and entire villages, erasing centuries-old rural communities from the landscape.



Rural Exodus

Driven off their ancestral lands, rural inhabitants had no choice but to leave, causing dramatic population decline across the English countryside.



Urban Flood

Displaced populations surged into growing towns and cities, fueling explosive urbanization and creating the massive industrial workforce capitalism required.

Recent Historical Studies Validate Key Claims

Sharp Inequality Increase
